McGovern Grabs 2 More

Sen. George McGovern picked up 56 more delegates to the Democratic National Convention — 34 from Oregon and 22 from Rhode Island — as he rolled to presidential primary victories Tuesday in those two

According to a wire service delegate survey, McGovern now has 506 delegate votes, more than a third of the required 1,-509 — and enough to make him the obvious front-runner for the Democratic nomination.

In Oregon, McGovern, the only major candidate who campaigned there, captured half the votes in an 11-candidate field. His 50 per cent was better than predicted by polls, but slightly short of the 51.3 per cent he won in Massachusetts and hand to in Massachusetts and hoped to


In Rhode Island, McGovern had 15,468 votes or 41 per cent, Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, 7,755 or 21 per cent; Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, 7,586 or 20 per cent,

and Gov. George C. Wallace, 5,788 or 15 per cent.

Wallace, recuperating from an assassination attempt, fared much better in Oregon where he was a surprise second. Humphrey, who bypassed Oregon to concentrate on the California primary two weeks away, was

2 Blasts; Fatalities Are Capt., 2 Enlisted Men

By DAN SYNOVEC Staff Writer (S&S) HEIDELBERG Three servicemen were killed and five persons injured here

early Wednesday evening when two bombs went off in Campbell Barracks, headquarters of the U.S. Army, Europe.

The dead were an Army cap-

tain and two enlisted men. The injured, all treated at the 130th Station Hospital and released were two officers, an enlisted man and two dependent wives.

The bombs had apparently been planted in or under automobiles parked inside the walled and fenced headquarters complex.

The first of the blasts, which inflicted the fatal injuries, came at approximately 6:10 p.m., and blew a hole in the (Cont. on Page 28, Col. 1)
