

Drug Use Cut to 2% in Military

WASHINGTON (S&S) — The armed forces have done an excellent job to control the drug problem even though they haven't solved it, according to the Pentagon's top medical expert.

Dr. Richard S. Wilbur, assistant defense secretary for health and environment, told Pentagon newsmen that in the

last year the military services have cut drug abuse in half in Vietnam and now successfully rehabilitate and return to duty a large number of former drug users.

"We have made enormous progress thus far, but the problem has not been solved," he said, and added civilians can learn a lot from the military

experience in such areas as urinalysis tests for public schools, the standardization of biochemical laboratories and education and prevention programs.

Wilbur said that even if all U.S. troops were moved out of Vietnam, where the drug problem is the greatest, the military would still be faced with something that is fundamental to today's society.

The typical drug user is the product of a broken home where one of his parents is either an alcoholic or a drug user, he said. The serviceman had a problem before he put on a uniform.

On a worldwide basis about 2

per cent of the military population has been found to be using drugs of one kind or another, or about the same percentage as experimenting with drugs in high schools, he said.

Urinalysis testing to spot the users of heroin and other dangerous drugs began almost a year ago as a part of a massive servicewide campaign. Troops leaving Vietnam were first tested. Since then the program has been refined to include random tests worldwide to include those leaving the U.S. for duty in Southeast Asia.

When the tests were first started, Wilbur said, about 5 1/2 per cent of those leaving Viet-

nam were found to be using drugs. Now this is down to around 2 per cent. Rates for random testing in Vietnam are a little higher, but they also show a downward trend.

In late 1970, as many as 15 servicemen died each month from an overdose of drugs in Vietnam. Now that figure has been cut to one or two a month.

Wilbur also said that in some areas up to 80 to 90 per cent of drug users have been returned to effective duty through a program of abstinence and without the aid of Methadone treatment, a chemical drug substitute.

Bombers Threaten 3 Blasts Friday in Stuttgart Area

(Continued from Page 1) which exploded and killed the three servicemen.

The Army's V Corps headquarters in Frankfurt was bombed May 11 in the first of six bombings in the last two weeks. An Army lieutenant colonel was killed and 13 other persons wounded in the Frankfurt attack.

The RAF claimed in letters to DPA that it bombed the U.S. installations in retaliation for American military activities against North Vietnam.

The latest letter also refers to the May 19 bombing of the Hamburg editorial offices of conservative publisher Axel Springer.

"Springer is lying," asserted the letter. "He was warned 31 hours before."

Springer, who has campaigned in his newspaper for police crackdowns on leftist extremists collectively known as the Baader-Meinhof gang, claimed the bombings came with five-minute warning.

Seventeen persons were injured in the attack on Springer's building. He publishes the mass circulation Bild Zeitung, West Germany's largest newspaper.

Terrorist bombs ripped through German police buildings in Munich and Augsburg May 12, causing substantial damages but no serious injuries.

Three days later, an auto belonging to a West German supreme court judge investigating the extremists was blown up in Karlsruhe. The judge was not in the car but his wife was severely injured in the blast.

Chancellor Willy Brandt went on national television Friday night in an appeal to West Germans to help authorities capture the terrorists.

Brandt said the bombers are "a small group of criminal anarchists who are spreading ter-

ror for terror's sake."

Hard-core members of the terrorists are said by West German authorities to be largely identical to the Baader-Meinhof gang, wanted for bank robberies and car thefts and other violent acts in West Germany over the last two years.

Andreas Baader is a convicted arsonist and Ulrike Meinhof a leftist journalist.

German officials have offered \$59,000, rewards for information

leading to the capture of gang members.

State Interior Minister Walter Krause of Baden-Wuerttemberg said he considered the Stuttgart threat "very serious" and said it caused "great anxiety."

Krause said he had received information last week that "the RAF planned something in Stuttgart." He said security measures now in effect will be tightened, but he would not go into detail.

Spanish Authorities Smash Terror Ring

BARCELONA, Spain (UPI) — Spanish authorities Sunday announced the smashing of the "Catalan Liberation Front," an extremist organization blamed by officials for at least 26 bombings in Barcelona province.

Barcelona Police Chief Sergio Gomez and provincial Gov. Tomas Pelayo told newsmen that nine persons have been arrested and warrants issued for the arrest of seven more.

Gomez and Pelayo said the arrests were the result of investigations made after a Barcelona Spanish Civil War monument was blown up earlier this month.

Investigations led to the discovery of "a terrorist organization called Front del Lliberament Catala... a clandestine party created in 1968 by extremist elements whose principal objective is the liberation of Catalan and the imposition of socialism by violent means," the two officials said.

The announcement came three weeks after Madrid police arrested seven members of a group of urban guerrillas who,

police said, had planned to commit a series of bombings and other acts of violence in the capital and then flee to China, by hijacking a Spanish airline jet.

The Barcelona officials said police had seized more than 450 pounds of explosives, 700 detonators and other material.

The group consisted partly of high school students and was led by four men identified as Carlos Garcia, Ramon Llorca, Jose Pascal and Alfonso Cervera, the officials said.

They alleged the group had committed 26 bombings in the past two years — most of them against railway installations and buildings housing government offices, police or branches of the state-controlled radio and television networks. One bombing in March 1971 against a tax office at Sagrera, killed a policeman.

Under Spain's new anti-terrorist laws, persons convicted of using explosives in terrorist acts face 30 years' imprisonment to death.

Europe, Korea Commands

5 AF Generals Draw New Jobs

WASHINGTON (S&S) — The Defense Department has announced a series of five changes involving top Air Force commanders in Europe and in Korea.

Maj. Gen. William F. Pitts, commander of the 3rd Air Force in England, will take over NATO's 6th Allied Tactical Air Force in Turkey and Maj. Gen. Dale S. Sweat, CG of the 17th Air Force in Germany, will

become vice commander of the Tactical Air Command at Langley AFB, Va.

Maj. Gen. Robert W. Maloy, presently CG of the 314th Air Division at Osan AB, and senior USAF officer in Korea, will take command of the 17th at Ramstein AB, Germany.

Maloy will be replaced on June 5 by Brig. Gen. Travis R. McNell, who is now on the staff of the Readiness Command at

MacDill AFB, Fla. Pitts will be replaced by Maj. Gen. James E. Hill, a fighter ace who is now the deputy assistant for atomic energy to Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird.

Pitts will assume command of the NATO air force in Turkey on July 1, and Hill will report to the United Kingdom on June 12. Sweat is due to report to Langley AFB on Aug. 1.
